
Dear Reader,

News from the Committees

Arctic Data Committee (ADC)

In autumn 2016 ADC organised the Interoperability Workshop in cooperation with a <u>series of partners</u>. The Committee met in this context and is currently developing its 2017-19 work plan under these heading:

- Mapping the Arctic Data Ecosystem
- Polar data publication and citations
- Definition of Metadata Elements
- Network building
- Explore options to create a polar group under the Research Data Alliance
- Outreach

The Committee is also currently reviewing its Terms of Reference. The chair of SAON is Peter L. Pulsifer. Vice-chairs are Marten Tacoma and Stein Tronstad. The Committee web site: http://arcticdc.org.

Committee on Observations and Networks (CON)

This Committee is also currently developing its 2017-19 work plan with these elements:

- Define requirements for inventories of observational assets (programs, projects, platforms and networks), also as a contribution to EU-PolarNet
- Contributing to GEO
- Contribute to INTAROS
- Contribute to WMO Rolling Review of Requirements (RRR)
- Developing best practises for SAON Networks
- Developing best practises for national SAON offices

The Committee is also currently reviewing its Terms of Reference. Co-Chairs of CON are Lisa Loseto and Hannele Savela. More information about the Committee is found here.

Development of an International Arctic Observations Assessment Framework

The Arctic Observing Summit (AOS is the outreach event of SAON. The summit statement from 2016 called to "coordinate" the implementation of a pan-Arctic observing system with regional and global observing initiatives, and organize efforts in securing resources for its sustained operation through the leadership of the SAON initiative." In January 2017, the Science and Technology Policy Institute (STPI) in Washington and SAON convened a workshop with experts representing 9 countries. The workshop developed a framework, defining 12 Social Benefit Areas providing a common, crosscutting set of international service, operational, and research objectives for the Arctic.1

Arctic Science Ministerial Meeting US Arctic Observing Network Office

Science ministers met in September 2016 in Washington DC, USA. The statement from the meeting mentions SAON as a critical contributor to 'Strengthening and Integrating Arctic Observations and Data Sharing'²

An outcome from the Arctic Science Ministerial Meeting is that as a contribution to SAON, the U.S. National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration (NOAA) has opened a U.S. AON Office. It will "foster interagency and international collaboration in the development of Arctic observing and data systems, as well as the delivery of higher-level data and information to the scientific community and policymakers."³

External review of SAON

An external Committee conducted a review of SAON in 2016. (Click here for the summary or the full report.) The Committee concluded that SAON was valued by the Arctic observing community, but had yet to reach its full potential. "With refinements to its Vision, Mission and Goals, improvements to its Organizational Structure, a new focus on funding and sustainability, and increased outreach and communication efforts, SAON should be able to make great strides in the next five years to enhance pan-Arctic observing networks to meet the needs of Arctic peoples."

The review was presented to the Arctic Council Senior Arctic Officials meeting in October 2016. They noted that "everyone supports the idea of SAON, and that the entity has had a number of successes in its first 5 years. Nonetheless, SAON is evolving, and this review process has delivered some good ideas for potential improvements to SAON, and for ways in which the Council can help it to improve."

As a response to the review, the SAON Board is currently developing a strategic framework for SAON – see below.

SAON Board

The Board met 7th April in Prague, Czech Republic, with participants from 15 countries, 2 indigenous organisations and 6 organisations/networks. The purpose of the meeting was to review the activities of the Committees and to prepare a response to the external review. The Board will meet 27-28 June 2017 to draft a strategic framework for SAON.
